THANKSGIVING.

Governor Johnston recommends the observance of Thursday, the 29th of November, inst., as a day of general thanksgiving throughout the State. This is the day fixed upon by a number of other States, and we trust it will be duly observed by all our people.

The Farmers of Columbia, have finished their plowing and seeding for the season, and in all directions the threshing of grain is going on with great despatch. The new grain fields are green and beautiful, promising another abundant harvest.

LARGE YIELD.—The Winchester Virginian states, that Jacob Roes, Esq., near Bunkerhill, in Berkeley county, raised on two acres and near seventy poles of land, 111 bushels of merchantable wheat, of the Zimmerman kind, which is a fraction over 46 bushels to the acre.

Important Agricultural Improvement.

We have just had the pleasure of witnessing the operation of a newly invented CORN SHELLER, patented by Isaac Hepler, Esq., of Northumberland co. Pa. As a labor saving machine, it is certainly of great importance to the farmer, and it is no doubt destined from its durability and cheapness to find its way speedily into almost every farmer's barn. In our humble opinion, no farmer who raises large crops of corn, and who studies his own pecuniary interest, should be without one of these machines: and if we are not greatly mistaken they will, as soon as they can be brought to the notice of the farming community, take the place entirely of every other contrivance for cora shelling.

The Russian General asks the Sultan of Turkey, to surrender Kossuth and other Hungarian exiles. The Sultan responds with a decided No! Whereupon much fear prevails of a Continental war, in which Turkey, France and England will do battle against Nicholas. We shall see what we shall see.

A Monster Salary.

An extract of a letter from San Francisco, published in a late number of the Pennsylvaniaist, states that Col. GEARY'S salary as First Alcalde of that city amounts to the enormous sum of one hundred dollars per day, or thirty five thousand five hundred dollars per year! This is the latest and highest salary ever paid in any city.

An Old Goose.—The Bridgeton [N. J.] Pioneer has in its obituary columns, the death of an aged goose, in her 23d year.

Belgium like the other Governments of Europe, is miserably in debt. It owes a national debt of more than 152,500,000 dollars, besides a floating debt under the form of treasury notes, which amounts to between six and ten millions. All this might be paid with ease, if the arms were entirely done away.

It is said that Mr. Bodisco the late Russian Minister at Washington, and the husband of an American wife, has been sent to Siberia for the crime of owning property in this country. Bodisco was entrapped, it seems, to return to Russia; his crime having been first discovered by a spy.
