Burnt Barn.—We regret to learn that, the barn of Mr. GEARHART, of Valley township, about two miles from Danville, was consumed by fire, early on Friday evening last, with all its contents.

CHARLES M. GEARHART, of Rush township, Northumberland county, has been arrested in Mount Vernon, Ohio, on a charge of having stolen money to the amount of about \$1000 from different letters mailed and received at the Post Office in this borough, where he had been lately employed as Clerk. It is said, a telegraphic despatch received by the Postmaster of this place says the Danville Democrat, that some of the notes in his possession have been identified as the money alleged to have been stolen. He is expected to bring here in a day or two by C. GARRETSON, Esq., who went in pursuit of him.

S.—Since the above was in type, a letter has been received from Mr. Garretson stating that the sum of \$3,684 in cash and checks had been found in the possession of young Gearhart, and placed in the hands of the Sheriff at Mount Vernon for safe keeping.
