THE SUGAR TRADE OF BOSTON, MASS. Hickman's maj. 2439 -Boston Mass., is claimed to be one of the greatest and most important sugar markets in the world. The receipts of sugar for the first nine months of this year Bucks were 36,992 hogsheads, 31,965 barrels, Lehigh 157,883 bags, priscipally from India, 75,150.
