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SUMMARY OF NEWS.

LOUISIANA has thanksgiving on the 29th instant. DICKENS, it is stated, has received five thousand dollars from the Harpers for his story of "Hunted Down."

THE Norwegians of Iowa are raising funds with which to endow a college. Twenty thousand dollars have been subscribed.

THE famine in southern Kansas is very severe. Thousands of pounds of flour and provisions are going on to the sufferers from the Western States.

THE IRON HORSE.—There is now in operation in the United States, one mile of railroad to every 1000 inhabitants; in England, one to every 2500; and in the whole of Great Britain, one to every 8000 inhabitants.

BARNUM AGAIN.—Mr. Barnum has been in this City to make preparations to open a Museum. It is to be located in Chestnut street, and will, in its principal features, be similar to his establishment in New York.—Philadelphia Times.

FEMALE "LYNCHERS."—On Saturday, a crowd of women went to a tavern, in Corwin, Ohio, and poured out all the liquor on the ground. They then notified another tavern keeper that if he did not give up the business in ten days he should share the same fate.

PRISONERS SENTENCED IN DELAWARE. Kent county (Del.) Court has sentenced John R. Hamilton, convicted of killing his wife, to pay a fine of \$1,000, to stand in the pillory one hour, receive 60 lashes and imprisonment for life.

A FATAL accident occurred in the Port Griffith coal mines, near Scranton, on the 25th ult. While a car load of miners were going down a slope of 1500 feet, the rope broke when about half down, the car was precipitated to the bottom, and eight miners were killed, and two so severely hurt as not to be expected to live.

THE SUGAR TRADE OF BOSTON, MASS.—Boston Mass., is claimed to be one of the greatest and most important sugar markets in the world. The receipts of sugar for the first nine months of this year were 36,992 hogheads, 31,965 barrels, 157,883 bags, principally from India, 75,150. About 200 cargoes, or 65,000 hogheads of molasses are also annually landed at that port, and vast quantities of both sugar and molasses are sent from there to all parts of the world.

CENSUS OF MINNESOTA.—The following is the summary up of the Marshal of the census of Minnesota: Total population, 170,935; number of farms, 10,093; number of manufacturing establishments, 503; number of deaths, 1,205. The total area of Minnesota is estimated at 81,259 square miles, so that the population of Minnesota on the 1st of June, 1860, was a little over two persons to the square mile.

LATER FROM HAYTI.—Files of Hayti papers to the 13th of October are received, but they are unusually destitute of interesting intelligence. The priests all over Hayti are preaching the observance of the Sabbath, and the people appear disposed to follow their precepts.

PARAGUAY.—We have advices from Paraguay to September 1, but they contain no important news. Everything was quiet and the country prospering. The Custom House receipts at Asuncion for the month of July show a difference of \$109,421 in favor of exports, and in August the difference was \$147,314. Railroad and other public works were being carried on vigorously. It was expected that the United States would offer their friendly mediation to put an end to the difficulty between Paraguay and England.
