

A SUCCESSFUL ICE HOUSE.

A Chester county correspondent to "The Gardners Monthly" says :- Ten years since I built an ice house. After inquiry and reflection, I adopted the following details of construction, which have proved a complete success, the supply rarely failing until ice forms again.
