FROM M'CLELLN'S ARMY. Forward Movement,

WHITE HOUSE, VA., May 19. The army commenced moving at an early hour this morning in the direction of Richmond, and will encamp some miles in ad-1 35 vance of this place. The advance of General Stoneman reached the railroad bridge over the Chiekahominy yesterday. It is a long trussel bridge, two spans only of which are burned. It can be rebuilt in a very short time.

The enemy's pickets are guarding the whole line of the river in front, making it very difficult to obtain any information from that city.

General M'Clellan went on a reconnoissance to the Chickhominy to-day, and the programme of opperation in front of Richmond will soon be decided upon.

Gen. M'Clellan's Position .- On Sunday General McClellan, with the main body of 10 32 army, was within fifteen miles of Richmond. and stirring news may be expected any 1 42 hour.

> Pope's Division of General Halleck's army was within three miles of Corinth at the latest accounts, and a battle was imminent.
