DISINFECTING AGENTS .- As the warm weather approaches, our citizens should thoroughly cleanse their premises, rendering them as pure and healthy as possible. There are a number of disinfecting agents which will be found efficacious in removing offensive smells from damp, mouldy cellars, yards, pools of stagnant water, decaying vegetable matter, ect .-Either of the following will answer the purpose, while they cost but a trifle:

1. One pint of the liquor of chloride of zine, in one pailful of water and one pound of chloride of lime in another pailful of Skeleton Skirts, from 50 cents to \$2,00. water. This is, perhaps, the most effective of anything that can be used, and when consists in part of best white sugar at 121 thrown upon decaying vegetable matter of any description, will effectually destroy all offensive odors. 2. Three or four pounds of sulphate of iron, (copperas) dissolved in a pailful of water, will in many cases be sufficient to remove all offensive odors. 3. Chloride of lime is better to catter about damp places, in yards, in damp cellars, Nos. 1 4 2 Mactarel in Quarter and Half and upon heaps of filth.



## GREAT UNION VICTORY

TRIUMPH OF GEN. HALLECK!!

Ten Thousand Rebels, and Fifteen Thousand Stand of Arms Captured.

Gen. Halleck's Department, or that part of it, under Gon. Pope, has passed 20 1 es miles below Corinth, completely breaking up Beauregard's Lines and captured 10,000 prisoners, and 15,000 stand of

We have about 500 hundred prisoners, among whom are several prominet officers. On Sunday, as soon as it was daylight, the fight was renewed by General Sumner B 92 with marked success, lasting nearly the whole day. The Rebels were driven at every point with heavy loss.

I he ground gained by Gen. Sumner was about two-and-a-half miles. General Heintzleman, on Sunday morn-

ing, retook the ground lost the day before by General Casey. Our loss in the two days engagement, in
