A few hundred feet of boards, and three hours work, will make a comfortable shelter for half a dozen calves. Let them be well fed with the finest quality of hay and some cut cornstocks, and cut straw with about one quart of meal, daily ; and let them have a good bed of straw.

When there are a few weak and feeble sheep, let them be separated from the flock and placed by themselves, where they will receive a little extra attention. See that store hogs have a good nestwarm and dry; as they will not thrive well when exposed to the wet and cold of

winter. Let every domestic animal have access, at all times, to good water that is near by. When they are compelled to go a furlong or two-as many cattle do-they often drink to much which gives them the colie

STARTING SEEDS EARLY.

Rev. Daniel Emcrson, Summit co., Ohio, states that he has been successful in giving garden seeds an earley start in the following manner :

"Having selected the quantity needed, each sort is tied up by itself in a cloth, the name being written on a slip of paper, and enclosed with the seed. The packanges are then buried about two inches deep in the ground for a week or two .--When ready to plant, the kinds used for planting are taken from the bags used .--They will be found to have swelled, perhaps sprouted, and ready to grow if the groupd should be quite dry, it is best to Murch 7 1863 3 mos. seas water the drill after dropping the seads; and then cover with dry carth. Mr. E. says by this plan he has never failed to raise plants from every seed planted. If each seed is placed where it is wanted to grow, it will save the labor of thinning, Spun Cotton for Caulking, Ropes, Twines, Tar, Pitch Oakum, Blocks, and Oars, &c though many prefer to thin their rows, August 4, 1860-12m. leaving the most prominent plants to grow.

CURE FOR FOUNDER.

As soon as you discover that the horse is foundered take him to the nearest branch or stream of water and tie him in it, standing nearly up to his belly-his head so high that he cannot dring. If the weather is warm, let him stand in it several hours, then take him out, rub his legs thoroughly to promote circulation, and again tie him in the water, if he is still lame. By repeating this process two or three times the horse will be effectually cured. If the weather is cold when the horse is foundered, that is in the winter, the horse must not be allowed to stand in the water more than twenty minutes at a time, when he should be taken out and his legs rubbed diligently till they become dry and warm and the circulation of the blood made active, and this process must be repeated till the horse is oured, which will be generally within twenty-four hours .--This remedy will cost nothing, can do no possible harm, and will in every instance oure, if the disease has not been of too long standing. 



REMEDY FOR PEACH BORER.

Take about a half a pint of common salt; sew it up in a small bag of cotton cloth, tie this in the fork of a tree, where tet it remain antil the salt is dissol ed by TO YOUNG MEN. of two years, and the work will be done of two years, and the work will be done The brine that rans down the trunk of the tree, will kill both worms and eggs as they are desposited; besides, it proves a benefit to the tree. Should there be an accumulation of gum at the botton of the tree, it should be removed so that the solu-tion may reach the worms. It is equally destructive to the apple tree borer and sphis at the roots.

HOW TO FATTEN LAMBS.

Oats given to lambs as soon as they are able to eat it, will fatten them more ragidly than any other food. Place them in a small trough raised about six inches from the floor, so situated that the old cheep cannot get at them. The lambs will begin to eat the oats at about three weeks old. By this process, lambs at three weeks old may be made to weigh fifteen pounds to the quarter.
