NEVER PLOW POTATOES.

This may seem a strange logic, no doubt, to many of our readers; but if they will only try it, I think they will find a difference in the yield equally strange. Plowing potatoes will not answer with me. If the season is dry they do not grow until No. 117 and 119 North Second Street, the autumn rains come, and they then grow so rapidly that they are very tender and soon rot after being taken out of the ground, if they do not before; which is very often the case. My mode of planting and cultivating potatoes is to take a piece of corn stubble and cover well with barn yard manure ; then plow deep, and plant in every third farrow, the potatoes about ten inches apart in the furrow; then after you have finished planting, harrow Market, 1868-2m.

No 77 Dock St. Philadelphia. down smooth and roll with a light roller; then when they begin to come through the ground, harrow again in the same direc tion of the rows; then when they reach the height of about four inches, run the cultivator through the rows, twice to each row. After this, use the cultivator as often as you think proper, taking care to keep down the weeds and grass and if any weeds grow in the rows that cannot be reached by the cultivator, pull them out with the hand. Never use the plow to cover them, as you form a ridge that runs all the water from your potatoes in between the rows, where it can do no good. Potatoes grow up in the warm, dry months, and we sometimes have a number of small or slight showers that moistens the earth a few inches each time, and revives vegetation very much ; but it is only the heavy, soaking rains that reach potatoes that are ridged up. Go into your patch, after a slight shower, and examine the potatoes that have been ridged up, and see if they have been benefited by it much. Cor. Dollar Newspaper.

HOW TO INCREASE THE VALUE

OF A COW. Every one that owns a cow can see at a glance that it would be profitable to increase the value of her, but every one cannot tell how to do it. We can, and we think we can make it equally palpable to our readers. If a cow is kept for butdar, it would certainly add to her value if the butter making properties of her milk should be improved. In summer or winser this can be improved, just as the yield of a cultivated crop can be improved, by what is fed to each; and it is simply a question of will it pay, in manuring the one or feeding the other. Indian corn will add to the quantity and quality of the botter to a very sensible degree; and it is butter to a very sensible degree; and it is simply a question of solution, by experiment, whether it will add to the profit of the butter-maker to buy corn at one or two cents a pound, and convert a portion of it into butter at twenty-five cents a lb., or whether the market price of corn and butter may be, and another portion of it into fat, another portion of it into manure, for that is the natural rusult of the chem ical change produced in the laboratory of

the cow's stomach. The same result will follow any other kind of feeding. Good pasture will produce an abundance of milk, often as much as the cow can carry; but it does follow that even then it will not be oleaginous food to increase the quantity of butter, just as it sometimes proves profitable to feed bees to enable them to store profitable to feed her with some more ble to feed bees to enable them to store more honey. It certainly does not appear to us that the value of a cow, feeding,upon ordinary winter food, may be almost doubled by making that food suitable for LAS and PARASOLS, the purpose of increasing the quantity of milk, if that is the purpose for which the cow is kept. Is the whole business a hap-hazard one? We fear so .--Some persons know that they can increase the saleable value of butter by adding the coloring matter of carrots to it. Does any person know the value of a bushel of carrots fed to a cow to increase her value as a butter producing laboratory? 
