At Gettysburg, Tuesday, July 7th, '93, of a severe wound received on the first day (Wednesday, July 1st.) of the great battle at that place, Sergeant LEROY S. WADSWORTH, of Company F, 149th Pennsylvania regiment. He was the only son of E. A. Wadsworth, of Town Hill, Luzerne county, and at the time of his death was aged 23 years and ten months.

This young man was one whose merits and virtues require something more than the above formal notice of his departure from among the living. The opening of his life was one of much promise, and if he had lived he would doubtless have filled an honorable place among his fellow-men.

His office was as a son and brother were true and strong, and were steadily shown in the domestic circle. He had a most kind and genial temper, and a sincere heart. There being united with good sense and intelligence, gained for him the respect and warm attachment of his associates, and attracted to him the good will and confidence of the entire community where he was known.

About a year since moved by a spirit of patriotism he chose to leave the four embraces of a weeping mother, a kind father and dear sisters and loved friends to peril his life in the public cause.

His steady conduct and faithful performance of duty, soon commended him to the confidence of his officers and comrades; by whom he was greatly beloved. He was wounded on Wednesday shortly after the battle opened. Happily while still in the ambulance, after reaching the hospital his personal appearance and voice attracted the attention of a kind Catholic lady—a Miss Harriet Shilman—who had come there upon an errand of mercy, to administer relief and comfort to the wounded and dying. He remained in her care until his death, and she administered relief to his wants both bodily and spiritual.

Piously inclined, and religiously educated among Methodists, he received with a ready mind words of exhortation and encouragement from his kind attendant, and was enabled before his death to rejoice in a good hope of eternal life. His last words were: "O, how I fear! but I would be willing to suffer a thousand times to glorify my Father in Heaven."

He died at the residence of the lady above mentioned, and his body was brought home by his father in person.

On the 23d of August, near Orangeville, Columbia county, MARY ANN, wife of Cornelius Balles, and eldest daughter of Jacob Fitzgerald, of Town Hill, aged 31 years 8 months and 13 days.

In the death of this estimable lady, the husband has been deprived of an affectionate and amiable wife, the four children of a dear mother, the parents of a lovely daughter, and the church and community have sustained a serious loss. The numerous concourse of neighbors and relatives attending her last remains to their final resting place, on the occasion of her funeral, evinced the deep hold she had taken upon their affections while living.

The silent tear flowing down the cheek of those who united to her by no other tie than friendship and christian love, showed that though death was to her gain, her loss was deeply felt.

The deceased was born in Newport, Luzerne county, and was united in holy matrimony, to him who now mourns her loss, on the 14th of August, 1849. About 7 years ago, she, in company with her husband, removed to this place. Soon after they took upon them a profession of the religion of Christ, and united with the German Reformed Church of this place.

She lived a devoted christian life, and died in the triumphs of a living faith. Her disease assumed different forms, and in fact a chain of diseases, which finally baffled medical skill. In her last hours she enjoyed her consciousness, and made her arrangements for her final leave of her children and family as one that calmly departs on a journey.

The ways of God are truly mysterious. Cut down in the prime of life, and in the midst of her usefulness, the Master came and called for her. She has gone to that blessed world where there is no suffering, sorrow nor death,—where the wicked cease from troubling and where the weary be at rest.
