HOW TO KEEP BEEF.

In response to an inquiry for practical directions how to cure beef, so that it will keep until June, and yet not too salt for the table, W. B. Dryer, Douglass Co., Ill., writes to the American Agricultuaist :writes to the American Agricultuaist :--For every 100 pounds of beef, use seven Drugs, Medicines, Paints, Oils, pounds of salt, well rubbed on. Allow the which hours; take it from the vessel and pour off the drippings; then pack closely, and cov-er with brine, made as follows: For eve-ry 100 pounds of beef. 4 ounces of Selter. beef to stand in the salt for twenty-four ry 100 pounds of beef, 4 ounces of Saltpeter, 4 ounces of Bicarbonate Soda, 1 qt. Molasses.

Molasses. E. A. Leonard, Defiance Co., Ohio, says: I allow the beef to cool sufficiently after killing, then cut it into convenient sizes for use, and pack it loosly into a barrel in which I have previously placed a quantity of weak brine. When the meat is all in, or the barrel full, see that the brine cov-ers it. Let itstand two or three days, then take out the meat, throw away the brine since out the harrel, and repack the brine since out the brine cover the brine meat snugly. Make a quantity of brine sufficient to cover the meet, and strong enough to bear an egg. Add 2 ounces of saitpeter for every 100 pounds of meat, pour it on the meat, and it will keep until hot weather.



PICKLED PORK EQUAL TO FRESH.

A lady contributor at Perry, Ill., sends the following directions to the American patronage: Bloomeburg, Pa., Nov. 29, 1862. Agriculturist : "Let the meat cool thor- oughly, cut it into pieces 4 to 6 inches A TTENTION ! wide, weigh them and pack as tight as possible in the barrel, salting very tightly. Cover the meat with brine made as strong as possible. Pour off a gallon of the brine and mix with it one table spoonful of salt-peter for every hundred pounds of meat, and return it to the barrel. Let it stand and return it to the barrel. Let it stand one month, then take out the meat, let it drain twelve hours. Put the brine in an iron kettle, add one quart of molases, or 329 North Third Street between Vine 5 two lbs. of sugar, and boil until perfectly clear. When it is cold, return the meat to the barrel, and pour on the brine .---Weight it down, and keep it covered close, and you will have the sweetest meat you ever tasted."

WIRE CLOTHES LINE.

Geirgo E. Pomeroy, of Leanwee Co. Mich., in reference to the ose galvanized wire for a cloths-line : "In the first days of telegraphing and the introducion of galvanizea wire for telegraph use, I fancied it would make a good clothes-line. I sued it and it worked well. In 1848 I moved to Michigan ; I put up the wire for a line, and it is now in use as good as the day it was put up : it never rusts or mildews shrinks, or streehes. Tinned wire will not answer - it must be zinc-galvanized. The first cost is no more than hemp, and it will last always." - American Agriculturist.

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
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
