Longstreet, of Wilkesbarre, held forth in front of the Forks Hotel, to an audience of about two hundred men and children, in the afternoon. In order to collect the crowd for Mr. Longstreet, the "loyal" merchants and shop-keepers closed their places of business, giving all under their control an opportunity, or rather compelling them to attend. But after all, the thing was right "not big enough." "The country folks did not turn out," &c., as we heard a prominent man of the party exclaim. In the evening the grand finale was to come off, a torch-light procession, illumination, fireworks, &c., were to be exhibited. The little folks waited patiently for the fun, but were disappointed—led time came and no fireworks exhibited. The older juveniles not to be entirely deceived, collected together a large number of old boxes and barrels, and burnt them on Market street. The other performances of the evening consisted in the illumination of many of the Abolition dwellings with tallow dips, &c., also, a small procession of men and boys carrying wide-awake lamps. Really, we felt sorry for our Republican friends. They wanted a little fun, and had expended a considerable amount of their ill-gotten gains to have it, but, like their rotten principles, it all ended in smoke. It was a piece of presumption, however, for the Abolitionists of Columbia county to attempt to rejoice over the fraudulent majority of Lincoln. The Democratic majority in the county was the largest that has been since the days of Jackson, and this fact should have induced the shoddy-facts of this county to say very little about their victory. Considering the amount of money they spent—money from the corruption fund—the thousands of lying documents that had been sent them, the number of "walk speakers," embracing so-called Christian ministers, New England Infidels and Blackguards, who had harangued them, and negroes were promised by our Columbia county abolitionists.
