Andrew Johnson.

The new President of the United States has for years occupied a position of prominence before the people. As United States Senator, the honesty, integrity, and ability with which he discharged the duties of his station, have won for him the respect and admiration of the whole country.

When he arrived at his tenth year the state of the family finances compelled him to be apprenticed to a tailor, at which trade he worked until he reached his seventeenth year. He never attended any school, but acquired, however, a good common school education by studying alone.

His famous speech in favor of the Union, made shortly before the adjournment of the Thirty-sixth Congress, is one of the most able, eloquent, and elaborate orations in Congressional records. On the occasion of his State, he resigned the position of Senator, to accept the post of Military Governor of Tennessee.

The Future.

We have received many communications on the question which now seems to press most forcibly on public attention, to wit:—the treatment which the rebels and their leaders are to receive from the government. This question has curiously enough been more fully treated in the pulpit than anywhere else, and the clergy have rushed into the field in advance of the politicians, discussing the high character of justice, and admonishing the President and their hearers of what they think the religious duty of the hour.

The condition of the South, and of the people of the South, will rapidly adjust itself on the principle of self-interest. We do not mean to imply that their treatment is not a question of vast importance. On the contrary, the importance of the principles to be adopted in what is called "reconstruction" cannot be too highly estimated.

When we come to understand our system of government, though it be complex, we see how beautifully one part sets in harmony with another. Then we see our government is to be a perpetuity, there being no provision for pulling it down, the Union being its vitalizing power, imparting life to the whole of the States, that move around it like planets round the sun, receiving thence light and heat, and motion.

He concluded that speech by the following emphatic announcement:—"Now, permit me to remark that, while I have opposed dissolution and disintegration on one hand, on the other I am a hearty opposer of consolidation or the centralization of power in the hands of a few."

The most important questions which are now before the nation, involving the most extended interests, and on which our future most seriously depends, are no longer questions of war. In the election of Mr. Lincoln, and Mr. Johnson last fall, we accepted the decision of all questions relating to the objects and conduct of the war, and declined any longer to discuss them.

It is of paramount importance now to look to the future course of the Administration on the currency of the country, on the questions of high tariff or free trade, on the methods of raising revenues, on the relations we are to sustain to foreign nations, and on subjects of this general kind.

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Meeting of the Democratic County Committee.

PETER ENT, of Columbia county, be and is hereby appointed Senatorial Delegate, as the choice of said county, to the Democratic State Convention, which will be held at Harrisburg, on Wednesday the 21st of June, 1865, for the purpose of nominating one person for Auditor General and one person for Surveyor General, and most respectfully ask the concurrence of the other counties in this Senatorial District in his appointment.

On motion it was— Resolved, That the Democracy of Columbia county concur in the person selected by Monitor county as Delegate from this Representative District to the Democratic State Convention on to be held the 21st of June next.

The public will rejoice to learn that his health is now nearly re-established, and that he will in a short time be able to resume the performance of his official duties at Harrisburg.
