The Income Tax.

Every one subject to this most odious, inequitable and despotic tax, will say a hearty Amen to the hope expressed in regard to it, by the Philadelphia Bulletin of the 9th:

"We earnestly hope that the Government will before long find it possible to remit this tax, which is perhaps one of the very worst forms of taxation ever devised, and excusable by nothing but absolute necessity. We shall briefly state our reasons for this opinion.

1. It tends to lower the moral standing of the people by offering an immense temptation to deception. These deceptions are of a nature that in the vast majority of cases they cannot be discovered; therefore the inducement to practice them is proportionately greater.

2. It falls most heavily on the honest and straightforward, and lightest on those who act unconscientiously; the penalties fall exceptionally and do not alter this general effect.

3. It is inequitable, and, to many, exceedingly repulsive.

4. It imposes on many a long and troublesome labor to make the necessary estimates and calculations. Many who keep imperfect accounts cannot possibly do otherwise than guess, and here the honest and honorable make up for the deficiencies of those who are otherwise wise.

5. It requires very expensive machinery for its collection.

For these all-sufficient reasons, we hope that other modes of taxation will be found to take the place of this, which, moreover, is essentially discordant with the character of our people.

The Reading Gazette, says: "There is no present prospect that the Bulletin's hope will be realized. Instead of a mitigation of the most odious features of this tax, they have been aggravated ten-fold by the legislation of the late Congress.—A series of interrogatories has just been issued, from the Internal Revenue office, which outstrips everything in the shape of inequitable despotism that was ever attempted by any Government, either republican or absolute. These questions are of such a nature that not one in a hundred can answer them correctly, in detail; and not one in a thousand will answer, except under compulsion, from fear of the severe penalties with which it has been found necessary to enforce them. Taxes that are equitably assessed, and levied upon a system that accords with the spirit of our institutions and the character of our people, are paid as a matter of duty, and without thought of the penalties attached to default. But the income tax, as now attempted to be enforced, is so repugnant to every citizen's natural sense of right and freedom, that few, if any, will pay it, except to avoid the fines and forfeitures to which an evasion of it would expose them.

Under existing laws, the income tax must be paid yearly until 1870—six years longer. But, may we not, with the Bulletin, hope that the Government will find a condition to relieve the people of so harsh a burden long before then?"
