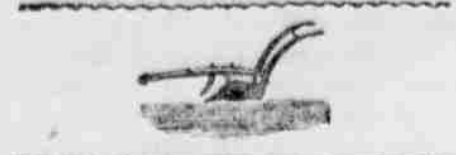

When to Cut Timothy Grass.

We find Dr. Kirtland's contribution to Mr. Flint's book on Grasses and Forage Plants very appropriately quoted at this time by the Prairie Farmer of the 4th, and as it will be read with peculiar interest just now, we give the following observations and conclusions of Dr. Kirtland, at the same time commending them to the thoughtful consideration of the reader:—

"Timothy grass is a perennial plant, which renews itself by annual formation of bulbs, or perhaps more correctly speaking, tubers, in which the vitality of the plant is concentrated during the winter—These form in whatever locality the plant is selected, without reference to dryness or moisture. From these proceed the stalks which support the leaves and head, and from the same source spread out the numerous fibres forming the true roots.

2. To ensure a perfect development of tubers, a certain amount of nutrition must be assimilated in the leaves, and returned to the base of the plant, through the stalks.

3. As soon as the process of nutrition is completed, it becomes manifest by the appearance of a state of desiccation, or dryness, always commencing at a point directly above either the first or second joint of the stem near the crown of the tuber. From this point this desiccation gradually progresses upwards, and the last portion of the stalk that yields up its freshness is that adjoining the head. Coincident with the beginning of this process, is the full development of the seeds, and with its progress the mature. Its earliest appearance is evidence that both the tubers and seeds have received their requisite supplies of nutrition, and that neither the stalk nor the leaves are longer necessary to aid them in completing their maturity. A similar process occurs in the union just above the crown of the bulb, indicating the maturity of that organ, above the point where dryness or desiccation had begun.

4. If the stalk be cut from the tubers before this evidence of maturity has appeared, the necessary supplies of nutrition will be arrested, their proper growth will be arrested, and an effort will be made to repair the injury by sending out small lateral tubers, from which the weak and unhealthy stalks will proceed at the expense of the original tubers. All will ultimately perish, either by the droughts of autumn or the cold of winter.

5. The tubers, together with one or two of the lower joints of the stalk, remain fresh and green during the winter, if left to take their natural course, but if, by any means, this green portion be severed, at any season of the year, the result will be the death of the plant.

From these five propositions the following conclusions are drawn:

1. That Timothy grass cannot, under any circumstances, be adapted for pasture; as the close nipping of horses and sheep is fatal to the tubers, which are also extensively destroyed by swine if allowed to run in the pasture.

2. That the proper time for mowing Timothy is at any time after the process of desiccation has commenced on the stalk as noted in the third proposition. It is not very essential whether it is performed a week earlier or later, provided it be postponed till that evidence of maturity has become manifest.

3. All attempts at close shaving the sward should be avoided, while using the scythe, and in gauging mowing machines, care should be taken to run them so high that they will not cut the Timothy below the second joint above the tuber."

Mr. Flint says:—"I have frequently, during the past autumn, pulled up the bulbous roots of timothy from the stubble from which a heavy crop can be cut with the scythe, while in flower, for the purpose of studying the changes which were taking place in these tubers, and have found them very similar to those represented in the 3d and 4th propositions, not only on moist, damp soils, but also on soils comparatively dry. Any farmer can satisfy himself of the correctness of these representations by a little observation in his own fields; and as the point is of practical importance, it is worthy of careful attention.—Boston Cultivator.

Double Flowering Trees and Bushes. Of these, there are many. The double flowering cherry is a pretty thing and blooms abundantly. The double Peach has several fine varieties, such as the rose-colored, the newer crimson, and the white. Lately, we have heard of a carnation or striped, and a camellia flowered. For free, luxuriant bloomers, commend us to the flowering Hawthorns, crimson and pink. And if the common single apple blossom is beautiful, much more so is the double. Among shrubs, the old flowering Almond pink or rose-colored, should never be overlooked. More recent additions to this family include the double white and large single-flowered Almond, pure white—Reeves double Spiraea is a gem in its way. The prunus triloba is spoken of as very fine, but we have not yet seen it.
