MURDER NEAR ASHLAND.—On Christmas day, a quarrel occurred in a public house at Locust Dale, near this Borough, between two young men named Thomas Griffith and Albert Pittz. It appears that Griffith challenged Pittz to fight. Pittz declined doing so, and started to go home, when Griffith came behind him and struck him on the head with a piece of wood, which crushed his skull. Pittz was properly attended to by Drs. Weber and Hallenbeck, Constable Jesse C. Tate, of Ashland, arrested Griffith on same day. Exquire Gensel bound the prisoner over to appear at court in the sum of two thousand dollars. Maj. Ellis, the District Attorney ordered him re-arrested and conveyed to the county jail, to await Pittz's injuries. Pittz died on Monday, (New Year's) Both Griffith and Pittz resided in Locust Dale, and both are under twenty years of age.
