Election Proclamation
WHEREAS by the laws of this Commonwealth it is made "the duty of the Sheriff of every county to give notice of the general elections, by publication in one or more newspapers of the county, at least twenty days before the election; and to circulate therein "the officers to be elected," and "designate the place at which the election is to be held"—Therefore, I, JOHN SNYDER, High Sheriff of Columbia county, do hereby make known and proclaim to the qualified electors of Columbia, that a GENERAL ELECTION will be held throughout said county, on TUESDAY, THE TENTH DAY OF OCTOBER, being the second Tuesday in said month, at the several districts within the county to wit:

It is further directed that the meeting of the return judges, at the Court House in Bloomburg to make out the general returns, shall be on the first Friday succeeding the general election, which will be the 13th day of October.

The return judges of Columbia, Luzerne, Montour and Wyoming, comprising the 12th Congressional district will meet at the Court House in Bloomburg on Tuesday the 17th day of October next, to make out an official return for Member of Congress.

The return judges of Columbia and Montour counties will meet at the Court House in Bloomburg on Tuesday the 17th day of October next to make out return for Members of Assembly.

And in and by the said act, I am further directed to give notice "that every person excepting justices of the peace, who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or

trust under the Government of the United States, or of any State, or of any city or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent, who is, or shall be employed under the legislative, or executive or judiciary department of this State, or of any incorporated district, in any office, shall be a member of Congress, and of the select or common council of any city, commissioners of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising at the same time the office or appointment of Judge, Inspector or clerk of any election of this Commonwealth, and that no Inspector, Judge or any other officer of any such election shall be eligible to any office then to be voted for.

It is also instructed by law to insert the following copy of an Act, entitled: "An Act for the suppression of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage."

AN ACT
For the Suppression of the Manufacture and Sale of Intoxicating Liquors as a Beverage.
WHEREAS All laws to be efficient should have the approbation and sanction of the people;

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by authority of the same, That the qualified voters of this Commonwealth are hereby authorized at the places for holding the general elections in their respective wards, boroughs and townships, on the second Tuesday of October next, to vote for and against a law which shall entirely prohibit, by proper and Constitutional regulations and penalties, the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors except for medicinal, sacramental, mechanical and ariserial purposes.

Section 2. That the officers authorized by law to hold elections in each ward, borough and township of this Commonwealth, are hereby directed and required at the places fixed by law in the several districts for the holding of the general elections in said districts, on the second Tuesday of October next, when they shall be organized as an election board, to receive from each qualified voter of the district, a ticket written or printed on the outside, "Prohibitory Liquor Law," and the tickets in favor of the proposed law shall contain in the inside the words, "For a Prohibitory Liquor Law," and those opposed to the proposed law shall contain in the inside the words, "Against a Prohibitory Liquor Law," which votes shall be counted and returned to the court house of the county or city, in which the said election shall be held, on the following Friday, by the return judges, who shall cast up and certify all the votes in the said election, or city, to the office of the Secretary of the Commonwealth, at Harrisburg, directed and transmitted in the same manner, the votes for Governor are required to be directed to the person named in the said Secretary's shall, on the third Friday of January next ensuing, communicate the said returns to the Legislature, to be opened and counted in the same manner; the votes for Governor are to be opened and counted, and considered as the basis of the election, and the commonwealth relative to a prohibitory liquor law.

Section 3. That all the election laws of the State prescribing the hours of opening and closing the polls, the reception of votes, the manner of counting the same, the defraying the expenses of publication, and holding of the general elections and return of the same, and all other matters incident thereto, be and the same are declared applicable to the election above authorized.

Section 4. That the laws of the Commonwealth, which relate to the duties of the Sheriff of the several counties of this Commonwealth, to insert a copy of this act, in the proclamation for the general election to be held on the second Tuesday of October next.

REPORT OF THE GRAND JURY AT SEPTEMBER TERM 1854.
To the Honorable the Judges of the Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace, in and for the said County of Columbia.

The undersigned Grand Inquest of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, inquiring for the body of the County of Columbia, Respectfully Report:

That they have, pursuant to their required duty, calmly and deliberately, investigated all bills of indictment presented for their consideration at this term, and have passed upon them accordingly.

They have also made a thorough examination of the Court House, Jail, and all other Public Buildings and find them generally in a good repair.

And they also report, that they find a large amount of public paper in the Prothonotary office in an exposed condition, we therefore recommend their immediate removal to the fire proof where there is sufficient shelving put up for their reception.

And they also further report, that it has been stated in the Inquest, that the road leading from Bloomburg to Berwick, in the township of Centre, is in several places in bad repair. Also, a public road leading from Aaron Kelchner's Smith shop through lands of Gilbert Fowler, Paul Zaner, William Hoffman and Andrew Feas to the German Church in Braceville township, needs immediate repairing, also a Township Bridge over the Canal on a public road leading from Centreville in Centre township, to Brown's Mill in Mifflin township, is unsafe and dangerous to pass, we therefore call the attention of the Supervisor of the above township, to the same, and request them to make the necessary repairs.

By Authority.
RESOLUTION PROPOSING Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth.

Section 1. Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, That the following amendments be and the same are hereby proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, under and in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof, to wit:

PROPOSITION I, TO BE ARTICLE XI.
Section 1. The aggregate amount of moneys hereafter contracted by the Commonwealth shall never exceed the sum of five hundred thousand dollars, except in case of war to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or to redeem the public debt of the Commonwealth, and the money so raised shall be applied to the purpose for which hereafter contracted, or pay such debts, and to no other purpose.

Section 2. To pay the public debt of the Commonwealth and debts which may hereafter be contracted in case of war to repel invasion, suppress insurrection and to redeem the public debt, the Legislature shall at their next session after the adoption of this section into the Constitution, provide by law for the creation of a sinking fund, which shall not be abolished until the said public debts be wholly paid, to consist of all the net annual income from the public works and stock owned by the Commonwealth, or any other funds arising under any revenue law now existing or that may hereafter be enacted, so far as the same may be required to pay the interest of said debts semi-annually, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than five hundred thousand dollars, increased yearly by five per centum per annum; the said sinking fund shall be invested in the loans of the Commonwealth, which shall be cancelled from time to time in a manner to be provided by law; on the portion of the sinking fund hereafter applied to the payment of the debt of five hundred thousand dollars mentioned in the first section of this article, but the said sinking fund shall be applied only to the purposes herein specified.

Section 3. The credit of the Commonwealth shall not in any way be given or loaned to or in aid of any individual, company, corporation or association, nor shall the Commonwealth hereafter become a joint owner or stockholder in any company, association or corporation in which the Commonwealth or elsewhere, formed for any purpose.

Section 4. The Commonwealth shall never assume the debts of any county, city, borough or township, or any corporation or association, unless such debts shall have been contracted to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or to defend the State in war.

PROPOSITION 2, TO BE ARTICLE XI.
Prohibiting Municipal Subscriptions.
The Legislature shall never authorize any county, city, borough or township, by vote of its citizens or otherwise, to become a stockholder in any joint company, association or corporation, or to raise money for, or loan its credit to, or in aid of any such company or association.
