To the Honorable, the Judges of the Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace in and for the county of Columbia.

The Grand Jury of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, inquiring for the body of the county of Columbia, RESPECTFULLY RE-PORT that they have examined the public buildings belonging to the said county and find them in reasonable good repair, excepting the platform in front of the jail with the hand railing around it and steps require repairing, new hand-railing in the entry up stairs together with some plastering and repairing of the wall inside of the jail-yard and repairing the privy in said yard which have been noticed in former reports; and further recommend that the wood work of the Court-House be painted outside and also for the use of the Court, and further report that the road leading from Warnersville to Shoemaker's Saw Mill is in a very bad condition, the fence being set in the road, making, it almost impassable for about fifty perches in Pine township.
