To the Commissioners and Treasurer of Columbia County.

**GENTLEMEN**—Permit me to call your attention to the following provision in the Act of 29th of April, 1844:

"If any county shall pay into the State treasury its quota of tax levied on the ad valorem valuation, previous days prior to the first day of August in any year, such county shall be entitled to an abatement of five per cent on the amount so paid."

I am induced to send you this circular, not much from the custom which has prevailed in this office, but because of the anticipated difficulties between this and the first of August next.

The large and pressing demands upon the Treasury, many of which cannot be postponed, may cause a resort to a temporary loan, (which is not desirable,) unless it is had in the usual quarter from the counties.

The credit of the State, as well as the generous abatement she has allowed in case of prompt payment, will no doubt induce you to come to her relief.

**Report of the Grand Jury.**

To the Honorable the Judges of the Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace in and for the County of Columbia.

The grand inquest of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania inquiring for the body of the County of Columbia respectfully REPORT that they have examined the public buildings belonging to said county and find them in tolerable good condition—the repairs recommended in the last report having been attended to. We would direct attention to the painting about the Court-House, and recommend that it be painted anew. We would also direct attention to the privy belonging to said county building, and recommend that the necessary repairs be made. And we further report that the roads in Scott township have been represented to be in a very bad condition, especially that part leading from Robert Pursell's in Bloom township intersecting the road leading from Eby to Light Street—also the alleys and some of the streets in Bloomsburg, which were represented as being obstructed, to which we would direct your attention.
