OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

Szc. 1. The state may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or failurers in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general arsembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

Szc. 2. In addition to the above limited powerthe state may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the state in war, or to redeem the present outstanding indebtedness of the state; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

Szc. 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this article, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on behalf of the state.

Szc. 4. Drovide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as aforesaid, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to ray the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a som not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual income of the subic works, from time to time owned by the state, or the proceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sale of stocks owned by the state, or other revenues of the sale, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of Government, and unless in case of war, invasion or insurrection, no part of the said sinking fund shall be used or applied otherwise than its extinguishment of the public dothe, until the amount of such debt is reduc

SEC. 6. The commonwealth shall not as SEC. 6. The commonwealth shall not assume the debt, or any part thereof, of any county, city, borough, or township; or of any corporation, or association; unless such debt shall have been contracted to enable the state to repel invesion, suppress domestic insurrection, defend itself in time of war, or to assist the state in the discharge of any portion of its present indebtedness.

SEC. 7. The legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough, township, or incorporated district, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, to become a stockholder in suy company, association, or corporation; or to obtain money for, or loan its credit to any corporation, association, institution, or party.

OF NEW COUNTIES.

No county shall be divided by a line cutrocoomy sant be divided by a fine cut-ting off over one tenth of its population, (either to form a new county or otherewise) without the express assent of such county, by a vote of the electors thereof; nor shall any new county be established, containing less than four hundred square miles.

THIRD AMENDMENT

Any city containing anflicient number of taxables, except that any control the divided in the formsion of a district. Any city containing and no county shall be divided, in the for-mation of a district. Any city containing a sufficient number of taxables to entitle it to at least two representatives, shall have a exparate representation assigned it, and shall be divided into convenient districts of con-tiguous territory, of equal taxable popula-tion as near as may be, each of which dis-tricts shall elect one representative."

At the end of section seven, same article, insert these words, "the city of Philadelphia shall be divided into single senatorial dis-tricts, of contiguous territory as nearly equal na taxable population as possible; but no ward shall be divided in the formation there-of."

The legislature, at its first session, after se adoption of this amendment, shall diside the city of Philadelphia into senatorial nd representative districts, in the manner bove provided; such districts to remain unhanged until the apportionment in the year ne thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

FOURTH AMENDMENT. To be section XXVI, Article 1.

The legislature shall have the power to alter, revoke, or annul, any character of incorporation hereafter conferred by, or under, any special, or general law, whenever in their opinion it may be injurious to the citizens of the commonwealth; in souch manner, however, that no injustice shall be done to the corporators.
