RESOLUTION PROPOSING AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE COM-MONWEALTH.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Penusylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendments are proposed to the constitution of the commonwealth, in accordance of the tenth atticles.

There shall be an additional article to said constitution to be designated as article eleven, as follows:—

OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

There shall be an additional article to said constitution to be designated as article eleven, as follows:

ARTICLE XI.

OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

Sec. 1. The state, may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or failurers in revenues, or to neet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts in the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, hall be applied to the purpose for which it was ottated, and to no other purpose whatever.

Sec. 2. In addition to the above limited power the state may contract debts or repel in vasion, suppress insurrection, defend the state in war, or to redeem the present outstanding indebtedness of the state; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

Sec. 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this article, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on behalf of the state.

Sec. 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and an annually to reduce the principal thereof by a swin not less than who hundred and fifty thousand dollars, which sinking fund shall consist of the earnual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the state, or the proceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sale of stocks owned by the state, together with other funds, or resources, that may be increased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the said sinking fund shall be used or applied otherwise than in extinguishment of the public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of the mild and the constitution, or corporated derivict, by vitue of a voic gentlement, and unless in case of war, invasion or unsurrection, ne part of the said sinking fund shall be used for public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below
