In addition to the above limited pow-er the state may contract debts to repel in-vasion, suppress insurrection, defend the state in war, or to redeem the propse for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever. Sec. 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections cne and two of this atticle, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on be-hand the state. Sec. 4. To provide for the payment of the
