RESOLUTION PROPOSING AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE COM-MONWEALTH. Rescived by the Senste and House of Rep-resentatives of the Common wealth of Penu-sylvania in General assembly met, That the following amendments are proposed to the constitution of the common wealth, in accor-dance with the provisions of the tenth article

BY AUTHORITY.

There shall be an additional article to said constitution to be degrated as article elev-en, as follows. OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

OF PUBLIC DEBTS. Sec. 1. The state may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or failurers in reve-nues, or to meet expenses not otherwise pro-vided for; but the aggregate amount of soch debts direct and contingent, whether con-tracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general arsembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and filty thousand follars, and the money aris-ing from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was ob-tained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever. Scc. 2. In addition to the above limited pow-er the state may contract debts to repal in-vasion, suppress insurrection, defend the state in war, or to redeem the present out-standing indebtedness of the state; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever. Scc. 2. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt con-tracted as aforesaid, the legislature shall, or its first seesion, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accraing in-terest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than use for the scale of the same, or any par which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the state, or the pro-ceeds of the sale, from time to time, by as-signing to it any part of the tase, or other revenues of the sale, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of Govern-ment, and unless in case of war, invasion fund shall be need stapplied otherwise than is extinguishment of the public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of five millions of dollars. Sec. 5. The credit of the commonwealth shall not in any manner, or event, be pledy edy or loaned to, any individual, company, as-sociation, or corporation. Sec. 5. The credit

 SEC. 7. The legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough to unship, or incorporated district, by virtue of a vote of its near indebtedness.
