The apron or feeding table is level, and of a proper height to allow the feeder to stand erect, and feed evenly and easily without annoyance from dust; sticks and stones are not liable to get into the thrasher, and the grain is not scattered, but thrown down to the separator. The two horse machine, attended by from two to three hands, will thrash from 100 to 150 bushels of wheat, or double the amount of oats per day. The one horse machine, attended by two or three hands, will thrash from 50 to 75 bushels of wheat, or double the amount of oats per day. The Feed-Cutter is a first rate article, and is very much used. It cuts fine and very good stalks are cut by it 3-8 of an inch long, at the rate of from 300 to 500 sheaves per day.
