RESOLUTION

Froposing Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth.

RESOLVED by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met. That the following amendments are proposed to the constitution of the commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth arricle hereof.

"FIRST AMENDMENT.

There shall be an additional article to said constitution to be designated as article elevin, as follows:—

OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

SEC 1. The state may contract debts, to supply essual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether con racted by vitue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the parpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

SEC. 2. In addition to the above limited power the state may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the state in war, or to redeem the present out tanding indebtedness of the state; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

SEC. 3. Except the dibts above specified in sections one and two of this strict, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on behalf of the State.

SEC. 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as foresaid, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fond, which shall be sufficient to pay the secruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two handred and fifty thousand dollars; which shall be sufficient to pay the secruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two handred and fifty thousand dollars; which shall not surp part of the taxes, or other reasonable for the public works, from time to time by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the Siate, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war, invasion or insurrection, no association; nor shall the commonwealth shall not in any manner, or event, be pledged, or loaned to, any in

**ECOND ANIENDRENT.*

There shall be an additional article to said constitution, to be designated as article XII, as follows:

ARTICLE XII.

OF NEW COUNTIES.

No county shall be divided by a line cuting off over one tenth of its population, (either to form a new county or otherwise,) without the express assent of such county, by a vote of the electors thereof; nor shall any new county be established, containing less than four hundred square miles.
