RESOLVED by the Senate and House of Rep-resentatives of the Commonwealth of Penn-sylvania in General Assembly met: That the following amendments are proposed to the constitution of the commonwealth, in accor-tance with the provisions of the tenth article hereof.

eti, as follows — ARTICLE XI. OF PUBLIC DISETS. See 1. The state may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or lailures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether con 'racted by vitue of one or more acts of the general as-sembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed aeven hundred and filty thou-sand diollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts as contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

In addition to the above limited power the state may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the state in war, or to redeem the present out-tanding indebtedness of the state; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the parpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever. Src. 3. Except the debts above specified in sections one and two of this sticle, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on be-half of the State. Src. 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as sforesid, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing inter-est on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereol by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual in-come of the public works, from time to time owned by the state, or the praceeds of the sinking fund shall consist of the reat annual in-come of the public works, from time to time owned by the state, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law. The said sinking fund may be in-treased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other rarenees of the bisken, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war, invasion or insurrection, no part of esid sinking fund thall be used or applied otherwise than in extinguishment of the public debt, until the samout of such debt is reduced below the sum of fire mil-tons of dollars.

The credit of the commonwealth shall not in any manner, or event, be pledg-ed, or loaned to, any individual, company, corporation, or association; nor shall the commonwealth hereafter become a joint sociation, or corporation. The commonwealth shall not as-sume the debt, or any part thereof, of any county, eity, borough, or township; or of any corporation, or association; unless such debt shall have been contracted to enable the state to repel invasion, suppress domestic neuroretion, defend itself in time of war, or to assist the state in the discharge of any portion of its present indebtedress. 


