**RESOLUTION Proposing Amendments to the Constitution of** the Commonwealth. **Resolvers by the Senate and House of Rep**-resentatives of the Commonwealth of Penn-sylvania in General Assembly met: That the following atmendments are proposed to the constitution of the commonwealth, in accor-dance with the provisions of the tenth article hereof.

FIRST AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional article to said constitution to be designated as article elev-en, as follows :-

en, as follows:— ATTCLE NI. OF PUBLIC DEBTS. SEC 1. The state may contract debts, to supply cesual deficits or failures in revenues, or 'o meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether con 'racted by bitters of one or more acts of the general asdirect and contingent, whether con racted by virtue of one or more acts of the general as-sembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thou-sand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debis, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debits so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

In addition to the above limited power the state may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the state in war, or to redeem the present out-tanding indebtedness of the state; but the money ansing from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts,

which it was taised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever. SEC. 3. Except the d. bis above specified in sections one and two of this article, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on be-half of the Nate. SEC. 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as eforesaid, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this shall be sufficient to pay the accruing inter-est on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thonsand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual insinking fund shall consist of the net annual in-come of the public works, from time to time owned by the state, or the proceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sale of stocks owned by the state, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law. The said sinking fund may be in-creased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the state, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war, invasion or insurrection, no part of said sinking fund shall be used or applied otherwise than in extinguishment of the public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of five mil-lions of dollars.


