RESOLVED by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met: That the following amendments are proposed to the constitution of the commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article becook.

PIRST AMENDMENT.

There shall be an additional article to said constitution to be designated as article elev-

OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

1. The state may contract debts, to casual deficits or failures in revenues NEC. 1. The state may contract debts, to supply essual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether con racted by vittue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

Src. 2. In addition to the above limited power the state may contract debts to repet invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the state in war, or to redeem the present outlanding indebtedness of the state; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

Src. 3. Except the d-bis above specified in sections one and two of this stitle, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on behalf of the State.

Sec. 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as foresaid, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, while shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on sech debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the state, or the proceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sale of stocks owned by the state, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law. The said sinking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the laxes, or other revenues of the State, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war, invasion or insurrection, no part of said sinking fund shall be used or applied otherwise than in extinguishment of the public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of five millions of dollars.

Sec. 5. The credit of the commenwealth shall not in any manner, or event, the pledged, or loaned to, any individual, company, corporation, or association; nor shall the commonwealth hereafter become a joint owner, or stockholder, in any company, association, or corporation.

Sec. 6. The commonwealth shall not assemme the debt, or any part thereof, of any corporation, or association; unless such debt shall have been contracted to enable the state to repel invasion, suppress domestic neutrention, defend itself in time of war, or to assist the state in the discharge of any to assist the state in the discharge of any to a sesist the state in the discharge of any to a sesist the state in the disch

Sec. 7. The legislature shall not authorize any county, cuty, botonegh, township, or incorporation district, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, to become a stockholder in any compary, association, or corporation; or to obtain money for, or loan its credit to, any corporation, association, institution, or party.


