RESOLUTION Proposing Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth. REMOLVED by the Senate and House of Rep-escitatives of the Commonwealth of Penn-ylvania in General Assembly met: That the ellowing auendments are proposed to the constitution of the common wealth, in accor-lance with the provisions of the tenth article hereof.

OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

OF PUBLIC DEBTS. SEC 1. The state may contract debts, to supply created deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and coultingent, whether con 'racted by vitue of one or more acts of the general as-sembly, or at different periods of time, shall herer exceed seven hundred and fifty thou-sand dollars, and the money stisling from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose winaitever.

In addition to the above limited power the state may contract debis to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the state in war, or to redeem the present out-tanding indebiedness of the state; but the money arising from the contracting of euch debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised; or to repay such debts. Src. 3. Except the drbs above specified in sections one and two of this article, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on be-helf of the State.

To provide for the onyment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as sforesaid, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fond, which shall be sofficient to pay the accruing intr-st on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and fify thousand dollars; which which be abblic works, from time to time owned by the state, or the proceeds of the raid of the thousand dollars; which which is same, or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sale of stocks owned by the state, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law. The said einking fund may be in-creased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the State, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war, invasion or insurrection, no paptied otherwise than in extinguishment of the public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of five mil-lone of dollars.

The credit of the common wealth shall not in any manner, or even, be pledg-ed, or loaned to, any individual, company, corporation, or association; nor shall the rommon wealth hereafter become a joint owner, or stockholder, in any company, as-sociation, or corporation. Sec. 6. The common wealth shall not as-sume the debt, or any part thereof, of any corporation, or association; unless such debt shall have been contracted to enable the state to repel invasion, suppress domestic therement, defend itself in time of war, or portion of its present indebted ress. Sec. 7. The legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough, township, or in-corporation, defend itself in time of war, or portion of its present indebted ress. Sec. 7. The legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough, township, or in-corporation, district, by virtue of a vole of its citizens, or otherwise, to become a slock-holder in any compary, association, or cor-poration; or to obtain money for, or loan its credit to, any corporation, association, insti-tuition, or party. SEC. The result be an additional article to said constitution, to be designated as article XII, as follows: ArtICLE XII. OF NEW COUNTIES.

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


