To provide for the nayment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as a foresaid, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fond, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing incr-est on sech debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two bundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual in-come of the public works, from time to time owned by the state, or the proceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sale of stocks owned by the state, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law. The said sinking fund may be in-rereased, from time to time, by assigning to it asy part of the taxes, or other revenues of the State, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in come of war, iuvarion or insurrection, no part of said sinking fond shall be used or applied otherwise than in extinguishment of applied otherwise than in extinguishment of the public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of five millions of dollars


