Sec 1. The state may contract debts, to probleme expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether can racted by livitue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shell never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

Sic. 2. In addition to the above limited power the state may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the state in war, or to redeem the present outstanding indebtedness of the state; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

Sic. 3. Except the debts above specified in sections one and two of this stricte, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on behalf of the Nate.

Sic. 4. To provide for the nayment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as a foresaid, the legislators shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the nea annual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the state, or the proceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sale of stocks owned by the state, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law. The said sinking fund rhall be used or applied otherwise than in extinguishment of the public debt, outil the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of five millions of dollars.

FOOTH AMENDMENT.

There shall be an additional section to the first article of said constitution, which shall be numbered and read as follows:

SEC. 26. The legislature shall have the power to alver, revoke, or annul, any chanter of incorporation hereafter conferred by, or under, any special, or general law, whenever in their opinion it may be injurious to the oifficens of the commonwealth; in such manner, however, that no injustice shall be done to the corporators.
