Report of the Committee appointed to superintend the burning of the Iron Safes at Reading, Feb. 27th, 1857.

READING, March 4th.

The undersigned, members of the Committee, do respectfully report, that we saw the two Safes originally agreed cpon by Farrels & Herring and Evans & Watson, placed side yside in a furnace, viz: The Safe in ose by the Paymaster of the Philadelphia and Reading, manufactured by Farrels & Herring, and the Safe in use by H. A. Lantz, in his store, manufactured by Farrels & Herring, and the Safe in use by H. A. Lantz, in his store, manufactured by Farrels & Herring, and put in books and papers precisely alike.

The fire was started at 8½ o'clock, A. M., and kept up until four cords of green hickory, two cords dry oak and half chestnut top wood were entirely consumed, the whole under the superintendence of the subscribes, members of the Committee. The Safes were then cooled off with water, after which they were opened, agd the books and papers taken out by the Committee and sent to H. A. Lantz's store for public examination, after they were first examined and marked by the Committee.
