Proposing Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth.

RESOLVED by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met: That the following amendments are proposed to the constitution of the commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article hereof.

FIRST AMENDMENT.

There shall be an additional article to said onstitution to be designated as article elevn, as follows:—

ARTICLE XI.

OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

Sec 1. The state may contract debts, to supply essaul deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether con vacted by vittue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

Sec 2. In addition to the above limited

Sic. 2. In addition to the above limited power the state may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the state in war, or to redeem the present outtanding indebtedness of the state; but the money ansing from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

Size. 3. Except the d-bts above specified in sections one and two of this article, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on behalf of the Nate.

SEC. 3. Except the d-bts above specified in sections one and two of this stricle, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on behalf of the State.

SEC. 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as sforesaid, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking found, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the state, or the proceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sale of stocks owned by the state, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law. The said sinking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the State, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war, invarion or insurrection, no part of said sinking fund shall be used or applied otherwise than in extinguishment of the public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of five millions of dollars.

Sec. 5. The credit of the commonwealth shall not in any manner, or event, be pledged, or loaned to, any individual, company, association, or corporation.

Sec. 6. The commonwealth shall not assume the debt, or any part thereof, of any county, city, borough, trownship; or of any courty city, borough, to township; or flavor assist the state in the discharge of any portion of its present indebtedcess.

Sec. 7. The legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough, township, or incorporation contenties, to become a stock.

SEC. 7. The legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough, township, or incorporation district, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, to become a stock-holder in any comparty, sesociation, or corporation, or to obtain money for, or loan its credit to, any corporation, association, institution, or party.

SECONDAMENDMENT.

There shall be an additional article to said constitution, to be designated as article XII, as follows:

ARTICLE XII.

OF NEW COUNTIES.

No county shall be divided by a line cutting off over one tenth of its population, (oither to form a new county or otherwise,) without the express assent of such county, by a vote of the electors thereof; nor shall any new county be established, containing less than four hundred equare miles.


