Report of the Committee appointed to superintend the burning of the Iron Safes at Reading, Feb. 27th, 1887.  
Reading, March 4th.  
The undersigned, members of the Committee, do respectfully report, that we saw the two Safes originally agreed upon by Farrell & Herring and Evans & Watson, placed side by side in a furnace, viz: The Safe in use by the Paymaster of the Philadelphia and Reading Railroad Company, in his office at Reading, manufactured by Farrell & Herring, and the Safe in use by H. A. Lantz, in his store, manufactured by Evans & Watson, and put in books and papers precisely alike.  
The fire was started at 8 1/2 o'clock, A. M., and kept up until four o'clock of green hickory, two cords dry oak and half chestnut log wood were entirely consumed, the whole under the superintendence of the subscribers, members of the Committee. The Safes were then closed with water, after which they were opened, and the books and papers taken out by the Committee and sent to H. A. Lantz's store for public examination, after they were first examined and marked by the Committee. The books and papers taken from the Safe manufactured by Farrell & Herring were, in our judgment, damaged fully fifteen per cent. more than those taken from Evans & Watson's Safe.
