The undersigned, members of the Committee, do respectfully report, that we saw the two Sales originally agreed upon by Farrels & Herring and Evans & Watson, placed side by side in a furnace, viz: The Sale in use by the Paymaster of the Philadelphia and Reading, manufactured by Farrels & Herring, and the Sale in use by H. A. Lantz, in his store, manufactured by Evans & Watson, and put in books and papers precisely altke.

The fire was started at 8½ o'clock, A. M., and kept up until four cords of green hickory, two cords dry oak and half chesinit top wood were entirely consumed, the whole under the superintendence of the subscribers, members of the Committee. The Sales were then cooled off with water, after which they were opened, agd the books and papers'ltaken out by the Committee and sent to H. A.
