The Election.

The STAR being published on Wednesday morning consequently we are unable to give any election news save that of Bloom ownship and a few adjoining districts .-The Democratic vote in this (Bloom) township considerably exceeded our expectations. The Republicans exercised every influence to carry the day, and with th aid of a few Bogus Democrats they received a small majority on part of their ticket. The excitement did not rage quite as high as on some former elections. All passed off re-markably quiei, although a considerable amount of electioneering was done. The full vote was not polled in Bloom, and it is altogether likely to have been the case throughout the county. Three hundred and nine votes were polled here ; seventy-three less than at last fall's election. In another column will be seen a few returns.

From the Pennsylvanian. Sir John Franklin—Tidings by the Steamer Fox.

The mystery which hung so long over the ate of Sir John Franklin has at last been solved, thanks to the devotion and perseverance of his noble wife. The screw eamer Fox, which she fitted out, has re turned to England. Her Commander, Cap-tain McCline, sings with him a dopli-cate record, containing the particulars of the ill-starred expedition, down to the abanment of the famous vessels, the Erebus and Terror, in April, 1848, by their officers and crew, and the departure of the party, 105 number to the Great Fish river Sir John Franklin's expedition, consisting of the Er-ebus and Terror, with 138 officers and men, sailed from Sheerness, May the 26th, 1845. On the 26th of June, 1845, the expedition was seen in Baffin's Bay. June the 11th, 1847, Sir John Franklin died, and on the 1847. 22d of April, 1848, the Erebus and Terror were deserted in Victoria Straits, thirty-three of the officers and men having died up to that time. If the story related by the Esquimaux to

Dr. Rae can be considered reliable, some of the survivors of the party were alive two years afterwards, in Spring, 1850. Dr. Rae stated in his communication to the Admiral-ty that some Esquimaux on the North Shore of King William's Land, which is a large island, had met, in the spring of 1850, forty white men traveling southward over the ice, and dragging a boat with them. The men then were in a destitute and pitiable condition, and later in the season the bodies of some thirty-five were discovered on the continent and an adjacent island, and Dr Rae brought home memorials from the spot which fully identified the party with the ex-

pedition. The history of the expedition sent in search of Sir John Franklin will ever remain one of absorbing interest. In 1848, no news having been received of Franklin, the English Government fitted out three vessals to proceed to the Arctic seas in search of the ssing explorer. In 1849, after a protracted and dangerous but useless search, the last vessel of the expedition returned. During the come period, a land party under Sir John Richardson, and another sea expedition under the veteran Arctic explorer Sir James Ross, were equally unsuccessfu! .--The British Government then offered a mu nificent sum, amounting to one hundred thousand dollars, to any private expedition that should afford efficient aid to Sir John Franklin. In 1850 no less than eight expeditions were fitted out, Sir James Ross again taking the command of one of them. Lady Franklin also, in that year, fitted out the expedition in the vessel that bore her name. and also assisted largely in despatching another expedition in the schooner Prince Albert. Mr. Henry Grinnell's expedition also started in the same year, and there

were eleven different vessels at the same time searching the Arctic seas for tidings of the lost. 
