In short, while battling against Filibustering and every other means of festination of evil spirit which seeks through the spoliation of other countries that agrarianism which is to be truly attained only through the due development and cultivation of our internal resources, it will urgently advocate every effective discriminating Tariff, the Freedom of the Public Lands, the construction of a Railroad from the navigable waters of the Mississippi to those of the Pacific, and every other measure which seems to us calculated to enhance the dignity of the republic and to promote the well-being of Mankind.

Having made arrangements for fuller and more graphic reports of the doings of Congress, and of whatever else transpiring at the Federal Metropolis shall seem worthy of public regard, it has endeavored to make our Foreign and Domestic Correspondence and strengthened our Editorial staff, we believe THE TRIBUNE may safely challenge a comparison with any rival, whether as an exponent of principles or as a reliable mirror of the passing scene.
