The Accommodation Train does not leave Scranton until after the arrival of the Morning Train on the L. & E. R. Rail Road, thus giving passengers from the Wyoming Valley a direct connection for the West by the Morning Train.

For the accommodation of way travel on the Southern Division, a Passenger Car will be attached to the Express Freight Train, leaving Scranton, at 4.40 a. m. Returning, will leave Junction at 3.40 a. m. Due at Scranton, 2.50 a. m.

Passengers to and from New York change cars at Junction—to and from Philadelphia via B. O. R. R. leave or take the cars at Hope.

For Pittston, Kingston, and Wilkesbarre, take L. & B. R. R. cars at Scranton.

For Jessup, Archbald and Carbondale, take Stages at Scranton.
