Our local column for weeks has been crowded out. Hereafter we will endeavor to localize at least what transpires.

The premium for voting at the Montour county Agricultural Fair was awarded to a gray owned by A. H. Roe, of Light Street, Columbia county. The same animal received a premium at the State Fair for fast walking.

The Williamsport Press comes to us both enlarged and improved. This is an evidence of its being liberally supported. The next mark of enterprise the Press makes, should be to improve its politics.

Snow.—We were very much surprised, on Monday morning last, to find the ground completely covered with snow. We are informed it fell to the depth of from four to five inches north of this place. In this place it was not half so deep, and soon departed, leaving our streets in a soft and wet condition.

The buckwheat crop in the northern part of our county this season is quite good, and of excellent quality. This will be cheering news no doubt to the lovers of "buckwheat cakes." We have seen flour in market, but it was probably from old grain. A due supply will soon make its appearance. Our patrons will not forget us, etc.

The coal trade this season so far has been very heavy. Few have the remotest idea of the amount of coal constantly passing our place, by canal and on railroad except those whose business calls them in the immediate neighborhood of these great thoroughfares. No true estimate can possibly be given. The trade is increasing rapidly every year as the demand also increases.

We notice several itinerant gentlemen about our town, who are told, design giving exhibitions of different characters, upon, or near, our Fair Grounds, while the Fair is being held. If we mistake not there is a clause in a certain proceedings of the Society prohibiting all shows from entering or exhibiting on the Fair Grounds. This sounds very much like disappointing the ventriloquist and his troupe.

The Election is over—the Republicans have carried the day—and "what a good effect it is already having!" we imagine we hear whistled by a portion of the ranks of our Opposition friends—that portion, mind you, which have no particular claims to smartness. It was told us the other day that a certain individual of this place pretended to argue that wages had "risen" since the election, and "times" were much "better." Well, this may be as it is; whether the election has had any thing to do with selling goods, is the question we would like to understand. We are prepared to say this much: our neighbor, L. T. A Remarkable Surgical Operation, for the relief of vision, lately, one of the most affecting accidents that can befall a female, and which, until recently, was looked upon by the entire medical profession as incurable, was performed successfully on Thursday, by Drs. Logan, Rankin, Detwiler and Horner. The patient is doing remarkably well up to this time, and bids fair for entire recovery. Probably no such operation has ever before been performed in Pennsylvania, outside of the city of Philadelphia, and very rarely there.

We do not desire to detract anything from the merits of Dr. Crawford and his assistants, nor to diminish in the least the fact which a successful operation of so critical a nature, should reflect upon them; but we nevertheless wish to inform the writer of the above paragraph that he is mistaken if he thinks that "no such operation has ever before been performed in Pennsylvania outside of the city of Philadelphia."

Drs. Strawbridge, of Danville, and Harrison, of Bloomburg, performed the same operation during the month of July last, in Danville, where the disease had been of some eight years standing, and the patient

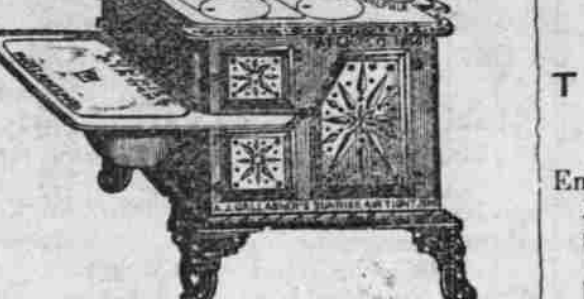
