In publishing our list of non paying patrons, in our last paper, we made a few mistakes. The name of J. D. McHenry occurred in the list, which was purely an oversight on the part of the printer. By a careful examination of the list, it will be seen that a name has been inserted in place of the one referred to; also one other name has been removed from the list, on account of the person being dead, which fact we were not aware of at the time preparing the list.

It appears that the President has called an extra session of Congress to convene on the 4th day of July next. This being the case the people of this district will be called upon to hold an election to fill the vacancy existing previous to that time. The Gov. order of our State will notify the different Sheriffs, in the several Counties composing this Congressional district, to issue their proclamations for a special election. This election may take place in June next or sooner. It then becomes necessary for the Democracy to make a good and judicious choice in their nominee, a man who is for the Union at all hazards.

The Republicans in this place, seem to rejoice over the demise of the Daily Pennsylvanian, especially the quill man of the Republican. The Pennsylvanian has always been an attentive guardian of the interests of the Democratic party. No corrupt measure was allowed to pass unnoticed, or denounced and condemned, in the most honorable and patriotic manner. The Black Republican party, feared no organ more than the Pennsylvanian. It showed them up to a glaring world in all their nakedness to a little better advantage than most papers, hence their hatred of it. It might be gratifying to some of our Democrats, but not very consoling to the Republicans, to know that arrangements are being made to start it again.

DEATH OF AN OLD CITIZEN.—On last Monday morning, after several years of extreme debility, Wm. McCarty, a well known and prominent citizen, died in Sunbury, at the advanced age of 73 years. Mr. McCarty had at an early day been one of the most enterprising and extensive book publishers in Philadelphia. As a business man he was distinguished for energy and enterprise, and in general literature he was probably the most thoroughly read gentleman in this part of the State. He had been a permanent resident of this place for the last seventeen years.—Sunbury Gazette.

Parks, containing Eleven Acres, be the same more or less, which is cleared land, whereon are erected a one and a half story Plank Dwelling House, a Frame Bank Barn, and other out buildings with the appurtenances.
