The Duty of Constables.

At the recent session of the Court of Quarter Sessions of Lancaster county, Judge Livingston gave the following instructions to the constables of the county, and as the law is precisely the same for Columbia county, it would be well for the constables here to read them: "While the office of constable is not a lucrative one, it is one of honor and responsibility. In some of the better districts of the county better officers have been elected, but in others there is room for improvement. A constable should be temperate and even tempered, and see that the laws are faithfully executed without fear, favor or affection. If the duties are not properly performed, constables are recreant to and violate the trust reposed in them. It is the duty of constables to see that the polls are kept open so that citizens may exercise their right of voting. As to the violation of the liquor law they may come before the court by remonstrance of citizens of the district by information, by the knowledge of the constable himself, or by complaint of a citizen made before a justice. The rule is rather to shield and aid the liquor sellers than to assist the officers to bring any violators to justice. The constables must look after violators of the liquor law single handed. The constables during the last year, with one or two exceptions, under their solemn oaths, made their return to this court that there were no violations of the liquor law in their respective districts. Constables who fail in their duty in returning those who violate the liquor law are liable to a fine and imprisonment and to be prosecuted for perjury. It is the duty of the constable to visit all places where vinous, malt or spirituous liquors are sold, and the constables will remember that the law requires them to enter such places as constables, and that law must be obeyed.

Forth-Class Mail Matter.

The General Superintendent of the Railway Mail Service has made complaint that samples of fertilizers, paints, powders and other unmailable articles are being sent through the mails from many of the post offices in violation of the regulations. The following is a list of matter that may be sent, as fourth-class, through the mails: envelopes with printing thereon, in quantity, blank bills and letter heads, blank cards, cardboard and other flexible material, flexible patterns, letter envelopes and letter paper without printing thereon, merchandise, models, ornamented paper, sample cards, samples of ores, metals, minerals, seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, scions, original paintings in oils, or water colors, and other matter which is not included in first, second or third classes and is not in its form or nature liable to destroy deface or damage the contents of the mail bag or harm the person of one engaged in the postal service. The postage on such matter is at the rate of one cent for each ounce or fraction thereof. Fourth-class matter may be registered at an expense of ten cents in addition to the regular postage.

It is a common practice with middle-aged people to sigh for the return of the good old times "when things were what they seemed"—those times when silk goods were not clever mixtures of linen and jute stiffened up with gum to give them weight and lustre, but were honest throughout in wool and web; when stockings sold as regular-made were as represented and not found on examination to be overseamed by hand instead of woven into shape in looms, as by right they should be. Thus throughout the
