We regret to state that Col. W. H. Ent, was taken ill on Thursday last; and has since been confined to his room. He was elected 1st Lieut. in the company which bore this place adieu on Tuesday last, for Harrisburg.

Court is still in session. The Commonwealth suits were all disposed of by Tuesday afternoon, and the Grand Jurors were discharged on the same day.
