Published by order of the U. S. War Department. Instruction in Field Artillery. Prepared by a Board of Artillery Officers.

Col. S. Cooper, Adj.-Gen. U. S. A. Sir—The Light Artillery Board assembled by special Orders No. 134, of 1856, and Special Orders No. 116, of 1858, has the honor to submit a revised system of light Artillery Tactics and Regulations recommended for that arm.

Section 1. That the system of discipline and field exercise which is and shall be ordered to be observed by the regular Army of the United States, in the different corps of infantry, artillery, and riflemen, shall be observed, by the militia, in the exercise and discipline of the said corps respectively, throughout the United States.

War Department, Washington, Feb. 10, 41. The system of Cavalry Tactics adapted to the organization of Dragoon regiments, having been approved by the President of the United States, is now published for the government of the said service.
