Some of the citizens of Jerseytown became very jubilant over the success of Col. Wright's election to Congress. Those who felt best over the result, procured powder and fired thirteen rounds with a cannon.

The official vote of this county will be seen in to-day's paper. Col. Wright has a handsome majority over Randall, the Volunteer candidate, who was started out by some of the dissatisfied ones in Luzerne county.

WE see it announced in the Democrat that a son of Jacob Remley, of this place, aged about 11 years, accidentally fell into the canal near Bloom Furnace, on Tuesday afternoon of last week, and was drowned. His body was not found until late in the evening of said day.

Dr. P. JOHN of the Republican, asks us why we did not publish Col. Wright's letter of acceptance. We would state that it did not appear in the Wilkesbarre papers until Wednesday, the day we publish our paper, hence the reason it was not in the Star last week. The Doctor ought to have known that much. We would now ask the Doctor a question. Why did you not publish the proceedings of your Republican Conference, which was in session one whole day and the better part of a night, in Wilkesbarre, on the 13th inst., before they concurred in the nomination of our chosen candidate, Col. Wright?

We saw by hand-bills that one hundred recruits are wanted to fill the Zouave Artillery Regiment, under command of Col. James Brady and Charles Campbell, now in Camp Curtis, at Harrisburg. Captain Mathews and Lieutenant Ricketts, are in this section at present for the purpose of recruiting men. Recruits in and about this place, will report themselves to Lieut. B. Ricketts, at the Exchange Hotel. The men will be sworn and mustered into service under the State requisition for three years or during the war. It is much more desirable to join a light artillery company, than Infantry. The amount of labor to be performed by artillery men differ very materially from that required of the Infantry soldier—having no knapsack, he is not required to do general guard service, no white detachments of the Infantry are joining back and forth, at their post, through the long weary night, the artillerymen are sleeping quietly in their quarters. Therefore should very much prefer joining an artillery company.

STAY LAW UNCONSTITUTIONAL.—In a case before Judge Sharwood, of Philadelphia, the Court decided the stay law, passed at an extra session, unconstitutional. The Constitution prohibits the passage of laws impairing the validity of contracts, and so far, the Act of Assembly is inoperative.
