Fourth of July in Bloomsburg.

The Eighty-Fifth Anniversary of our National Independence was celebrated, on Thursday last, in Bloomsburg, in the 'spirit of the Union and for the sake of the Union? It was a spontaneous out pouring of the people, from all sections of Columbia county, and not one incident occurred to interrupt its harmony or mar the exercise of the Day. From lour to five thousand people it is estimated, participated in the interest ing exercises of the celebration.

At 10 o'cl'k in the morning, agreeably to the announcement in the Programme, the sham 'Battle of Bunker Hill' came off, on the side hill South of Bloomsburg, between the 'British Red Coats' and the 'American Blue Coats,' under the auspices of Messrs. Enos Jacoby and Peter S. Rishel. It was a thrilling and war-like demonstration, and though bloodless in its results, was conducted with all the 'pomp and circumstances of glori ons war.' The British ultimately stormed the American Fort and besieged the Army.

At 1 o'clock, P. M., Marshal's Kiine, Billmeyer and Mensch, formed the people in one grand procession and marched to the Celebration Grounds in Snyder's Grove, North of Bloomsburg, where our citizens had made ample arrangements for Celebrating the Day, by the erection of suitable stands for the Speakers and comfortable seats for the people.
