RAIN.—If there be any significance in the old adage, "April showers bring sweet May flowers," the floral crop this year, will be unusually large. Rain, rain, rain, accompanied by a miserable east wind, in the order of the day; a few hours of sunshine, succeeded by a dismal storm. But it can't last forever, and we await patiently, but anxiously, the advent of the "sweet breath of goddess."

CONDEMNED CRIMINALS.—There are now sixteen prisoners under sentence of death in Pennsylvania, owing to the fact that no Governor will fix the day for the execution of any one condemned during the incompetency of his predecessor. Some have been under sentence 11 years.

THE NATIONAL TAX BILL, as it stands, will require the appointment of about twenty six thousand collectors. What an army of office holders! And what a large proportion of the tax it will take to feed them. Why not save a great part of this expense by giving the collection of this tax to the several states?

THE rebels have evacuated Yorktown, and no doubt well for them. Our forces are in pursuit of them towards Richmond, where it is supposed they will make a stand. We hope and are of the opinion, that secession is pretty nearly played out. From the looks of things, this war is soon to cease. We have various reasons for thinking so, which time and space will not permit us here to set forth.

COURT.—As we go to press there is nothing of any great importance before the Court, with the exception of the trial of Richard Torker for murder. This case was called up on Friday afternoon, and occupied a whole half day empaneling a jury. The case will be interesting, and will occupy the time of the Court for several days, from what information and knowledge we can gather in the matter.

On Monday there were no cases tried.—The Grand Jury were empaneled, Peter Extr being appointed foreman, and quite a number of bills laid before them, of which several were sent up to Court for trial. This morning, Wednesday, the Grand Jurors are discharged. On Tuesday forenoon a man by the name of CHARLES MARK was tried for theft and found guilty. The sentence of the Court has not yet been pronounced.

In our next we will endeavor to give a full account of the proceedings.

The people in attendance are nothing like we anticipated.

THE REBEL CONGRESS.—Among the news items from Richmond is one stating that the rebel Congress adopted a resolution on Monday last, to meet again on the third Monday in August. They no doubt desire to avoid the trouble and chagrin of a very sudden and undignified adjournment at the request of our army, and hence take time by the forelock. Where the rebel Congress may be on the third Monday of August next, it is not easy to say; but the probabilities of its meeting in Richmond in that warm month, are not very great, and we trust no where else.

GEN. SHIELDS PROMOTED.—Gen. Shields has been nominated as Major General. He is worthy of the honor, and we hope his confirmation will be prompt and unanimous.
