James R. Pennington has received the appointment of Postmaster at Cole's Creek, Columbia county, vice John M. Cole resigned.

On account of the absence of the editor for several days past, three or four matters intended for this week's Star are necessarily omitted.

The winter crops look well throughout this county promising a splendid yield. The fruit trees present the appearance of an abundant crop should it escape the frost.

The report shows the affairs of the company to be in a very prosperous condition, with a promise of an early dividend to the preferred shareholder.

County.—The regular May term of Court closed, in this place, on Saturday last, after a full week's session. The attendance was small, on account of the busy season.

There were but two or three Commonwealth suits tried. The first on the list we believe was Charles Mace, tried for larceny and found guilty. The sentence of the Court was, pay the costs and undergo twenty days imprisonment in the County Jail.

The "Lime Ridge Murder Case"—Richard Towsy for the killing of Andrew Bartz—was taken up and disposed of, occupying the Court for several days. The Jury brought in their verdict "guilty of manslaughter," and on Saturday the prisoner received his sentence, one year to the Penitentiary at hard labor.

Sheriff Furman has but one person to take to the Penitentiary this term. The civil list was high, most of the causes having been settled and put off for next term. The Lycoming Insurance Company vs. Henry Traugh was tried, Verdict for Traugh some twenty two hundred dollars. This cause was tried at our February term, when Traugh recovered, but not so heavy as at this Court.
