What has become of all the patriotism of our Bloomsburg people? The 4th of July is fast approaching and not a move made for any kind of a demonstration! It is just as great a day as it always was. It can't be possible that the patriotism is all oozed out in this place?

A son of Moses Coffman of this place, is home on furlough, for the purpose of recruiting his health, which is very feeble. He is a member of the "Iron Guard." His father went down to "Dixie" last week to see his son, but by the time the father got there the son was at this place enjoying the comforts of "sweet home."

We learn that William Mellick, son of Samuel Mellick, of this place, was wounded in the knee, by a piece of a rebel shell, not long since, in an engagement, in or near Shenandoah Valley. He is attached to a battery. We may expect him home as soon as able.

The body of the little girl that was drowned in Fishingcreek a few days ago has been found. It was discovered by a couple of men in the river, about a mile below Catawissa, near the shore, north side. It had been in the water some time, and looked very natural. A Coroner's inquest was held over the body the day it was found—Friday last.

The patriotic people of Berwick design celebrating the 4th of July in an appropriate manner. For the purpose of making arrangements they had a meeting of citizens on Monday evening of last week, at which committees were appointed to proceed to make all necessary preparations. They anticipate a jolly time—a glorious old fashioned Fourth!

Fremont has lately had some desperate fighting with Stonewall Jackson.
