War News.

A few nights ago the rebels on the South side of James River, opposite McClellan's army, commenced throwing shells vigorously into our camps. The shells evidently came from light pieces, for the enemy's batteries continually changed their places, so as to prevent our artillery from getting the range. In every case, where our guns were brought to bear on them, their batteries were silenced. Their shells did but little damage, a few tents being destroyed and some horses and a few men killed.

Managers flatter themselves that, although the past exhibitions held in other parts of the United States, have been eminently successful and entirely satisfactory to the public, the past experience will enable them to improve somewhat in the details of the arrangements, and in this connection they hope to give greater facilities for the deliberate examination and trial of horses intended for sale.

The entrance to Keystone Park for visitors on foot, is by the Center Gate, on Campbell Street. The entrance for Horses and Carriages is by the N. E. Gate on Campbell Street. The gates will be open for the admission of the public from 9 o'clock A. M. until sundown of each day.

The Chief Marshal and Superintendents of the Exhibition, will meet at the President's Tent at 8 o'clock A. M. each day, to perfect the arrangements for the day.

A Superintendent will accompany each set of Judges, and point out the different classes of stock to be exhibited. They will see that Horses are provided with water by their owners, and suitably arranged for exhibition each day.

REPORTERS. For the great convenience of editors and reporters for the press, a tent will be specially set apart for their use, and every facility will be afforded them to obtain and transmit information.

JUDGES. The Judges will assemble at the tent of the President on the ground, at 8 o'clock A. M. Tuesday, to organize and fill vacancies in the board, should any occur. The report of the Judges must be handed to the President's Secretary before Thursday noon.

SALE OF HORSES.

Horses intended for public or private sale will be labeled accordingly, and a portion of the ground will be designated for their examination and sale. The services of an auctioneer will be provided, and a time named for public sale.

Members of the several committees will be recognized by the following badges: Class Nos 1 & 2—Thorough Bred horses Navy Blue ribbon.

Class No 3—Stallions, 6 years and over, Green ribbon. Class No 4—Stallions 4 years and under 6, White Ribbon.

Class Nos 6 & 7—Mares with foal and breeding Mares, Orange ribbon. Class Nos 8 & 9—Fillies, Black and Orange ribbon.

Class Nos 10 & 11—Colts, Green and Red ribbon. Class Nos 12 & 13—Match and fancy Match horses, red and white ribbon.

Class No 14—Gent's Spans of Driving Horses, Light Blue and Pink ribbon. Class No 15—Family Horses, Red White and Blue ribbon.

Class No 16—Gent's Driving Horses, Blue and White ribbon. Class Nos 17 & 20—Saddle Horses and Ponies, Black and White ribbon.

Class Nos 18 & 19—Farmers' Draught Horses, red ribbon. Class Nos 21 & 22—Best Team, Pink ribbon.

RAILROAD ARRANGEMENTS.

No feature of the Horse Show is more pleasing to the managers, and we trust acceptable to the public, than the facilities offered for the transportation of horses and teams to and from the exhibition.

Pennsylvania Central R. R. Philadelphia and Reading R. R. Lebanon Valley R. R. Catawissa R. R. Williamsport N. Y. R. R. East Ferry. B. R. Susquehanna Valley R. R. will carry visitors, horses and teams free one way.

The Lacksawanna & Bloomsburg, Philadelphia, Wilmington & Baltimore, and Cumberland Valley, agree to do as other roads do. There are other roads to be heard from, which will, without doubt, come into the same arrangements. Thus it will be seen that the State of Pennsylvania is thrown wide open to the exhibition.

Daily Order of Arrangements. The gates will be opened for admission of the public, from 9 o'clock A. M. until sundown each day. Tuesday, September 2nd.

8 o'clock A. M.—The Judges will assemble at the President's Tent to organize and fill vacancies, and receive the books of entries for the exhibition. 9 o'clock A. M.—At the sound of the bell, the Grand Cavalade will form on the half mile track, in which all horses entered for premium exhibition, will assemble to be presented and take their places, as called by the Chief Marshal.

After the Grand Cavalade, all horses entered for premium will assemble under the flags designating their class for inspection. 10 o'clock A. M.—At the sound of the bell, classes Nos. 12 and 13 (Farm and Draft Horses) will assemble in front of the Judges' stand for inspection.
