The two late Columbia county companies were formed into the 132d Regiment and moved out of Camp Curtin on Monday last for Washington.

The Democratic Delegate election for this township will be held at the Court House on Saturday next, between the hours of 3 and 7 o'clock P. M.

Under the order from the War Department, everybody within certain ages, without reference to their physical condition, will be subject to a draft. If after they have been drafted, they are found to be disabled, they will be exempted. Persons, therefore, who ran to their physicians to get certificates of physical unfitness to be "shoulder or arms," waste their time and breath in vain.

The New Company now forming in this place is steadily filling up. Each volunteer in this company will receive a bounty from the county Treasury of \$25, one month's pay in advance, and the Government bounty. Some townships have furnished few if any men, but this matter will be straightened up by the Government, and those townships that have not sent their portion of men will feel the weight of the draft. It is the intention that every district shall do her part in supplying men by volunteering, and if not the mode of drafting is sure to be put in operation. It may be very inconvenient for some of our young farmers to leave for the tented field some bright morning through the force of a draft, therefore they should encourage enlistments, and see that this company is filled up, which will in all probability save Columbia county from a draft. There are plenty of volunteers throughout the county, and all that is wanted is a little encouragement from our industrial farmers and the ranks are soon filled up. An EXTENSIVE RIOT.—The principals concerned in the riot, at this place, on last Saturday a week, were arraigned before Justice Vanerline, in Hemlock township, on Monday last, and a great portion of them were bound over in the sum of \$300 each to appear before our next Quarter Sessions, on the 1st of September. Those bound over as near as we recollect were—Fras Brown, Daniel Beckley, Morris Sloan, Peter Rishel Esq., James Ralston, John Reiskwick, John Burdise, and others. There were quite a number of others brought before the Justice for the same offence—notably assaulting William Eyer—but for the want of evidence they were passed by for the present. It appears that these parties are trying to abuse the District Attorney, Mr. Little for simply doing his duty in this matter.—The more they conspire him in the matter of their arrest the closer he will apply himself to the case, inferring out all the facts in the matter. Justice will be done, we trust. The "boys," as Dr. John called them, in his last issue, do not feel quite as "boish" as they appeared on the day of the riot if we may judge from their down cast countenances.

DELEGATE ELECTIONS.—Our Democratic delegate election in Columbia county will be held on Saturday next, the 23d inst.—It should be exercised at the different places in order that good and true men may be sent to the Convention—men who will either vote or sell their votes contrary to the wishes of their constituents. It is important and very necessary that we make good nominations—select our best men and a success triumph awaits us. The office of a delegate is of no small importance to citizens of Columbia county, and especially in these peculiar times, when a man does not know when he is safe in making use of the right of speech. We are all in the mercy of the telegraph or any half-witted fool who sees proper to report us to headquarters for simply making use of the Freedom of Speech when it does not exactly chime with the sentiments of every fanatic in the land who bawls war to the sister and the loudest. The office of Congress is among the list to be filled at the coming election. This county has no candidate seeking the position although she may present a man before the Conference. Conferees will most likely be instructed to present the name of a gentleman from this county, although with a thorough understanding that the man does not in any way seek or ask the nomination. Representative Conferees will also be appointed. All these offices are of the most important and should receive our earnest attention. We want no half way men in the Convention—none but true Union men—Constitutional men and Democrats.
